

BERNINA RULERWORK SAMPLER

With BERNINA Quilting and Longarm Spokesperson Amanda Murphy


The finished BERNINA Rulerwork Sampler measures 24-1/2" x 24-1/2"

To complete this piece you will need the following supplies:

- A quilt sandwich measuring 29" x 29", made of solid or blender fabrics and the batting of your choice (cut your backing larger if you are going to be working on the BERNINA longarm)
- Machine quilting thread of your choice (I recommend Aurifil 40 wt. or 50 wt. cotton)
- A quilting needle (I prefer 80/12 Topstitch needles)
- BERNINA #72 Adjustable Ruler Foot
- A straight line quilting ruler/template
- A set of circle quilting rulers/templates that will quilt circles 1", 2", 3", and 4" in diameter
- Blue wash-away marking pen
- Tape of your choice to make your rulers less slippery on the fabric
- Supreme Slider or Free-Motion Glider


Using your blue wash-away pen, mark out the dimensions below on the top of your quilt sandwich. The design will be centered if its edges are 2-1/4" away from the raw edges of the sandwich. LOWER YOUR FEED DOGS!



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
Using your straight line ruler, quilt all the way around the outer edges of your design, about 1/8" from the blue line so that these stitches will later be caught in the binding.

Next, quilt over the internal blue lines - this time you want to be right on the lines which means your ruler's edge will be 1/4" away from those lines!

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


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
Starting on the left, quilt a horizontal line 3/4" from the bottom of the area. When you get 3/4" from the left edge, turn the ruler and quilt down to the bottom of the area and then quilt back up.



Continue quilting the line 3/4" from the bottom of the area, stopping to quilt a line down to the bottom of the area and back up again every 2". You can either mark the 2" increment on your ruler with painter's tape, or you can mark it directly on the quilt top. Or, if you prefer, make the brick widths random for a different look.




Quilt the next row from right to left, offsetting the brick divisions. Continue to quilt rows of bricks until you've filled the area.




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
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Using the wash-away pen, draw diagonal lines connecting the opposite corners of the block. All quilted lines should be parallel to these two reference lines.



Quilt lines as shown, varying the width between the lines and traveling around the edge of the block to get from one line to the next. (You'll be quilting one line from the lower left to upper right, the next from the upper right to lower left, etc.)



Quilt lines in the opposite direction to complete the block.



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
